## Common Features in More Effective Programs:

- Clear, unambiguous message
- Build on teen's goals
- Real family planning services
- No celebration of births
- Modest size case loads
- Consequences for noncompliance with program guidelines

## Health-Based Programs Show Strongest Outcomes

→Not tested in universal program setting

→More costly than welfare-based programs
